NOTES

Subject to the Royal National Agricultural and Industrial Association of Queensland Act 1971, and to the Rules, By-Laws and Regulations of the Association the following General Regulations shall apply to the Boer Goat Breed.

BOER GOATS WILL BE PENNED ON THE TOP FLOOR OF THE STUD BEEF CATTLE PAVILION.

The attention of Exhibitors is drawn to the following extracts from the By-Laws.

UNETHICAL CONDUCT

105 The Exhibitor, the Owner or any person in charge of an animate Exhibit shall not engage in unethical conduct. The Exhibitor, the Owner and any person in charge of an animal to which unethical conduct relates are deemed to have acted in breach of this By-Law, whether or not having been knowingly concerned in the unethical conduct. The Council (or relevant Sectional Committee) shall decide whether or not any conduct constitutes unethical conduct but without in any way restricting the meaning of that expression, unethical conduct may include the presentation as an Exhibit for judging:

- (a) of an animal other than in its natural conformation after normal feeding and grooming, except as otherwise provided either expressly or by necessary implication in the regulation or in the definition of a class in which the animal is entered;
- (b) of any animal having undergone any operation or procedure materially altering the structure or natural conformation of any part of its body, whether by the introduction of any substance or thing subcutaneously, or by any surgery, or by the administration of any substance or chemical or by the attachment of any object or thing;
- (c) of an animal having undergone any operation or procedure that changes by exaggeration, minimisation or otherwise in natural conformation or physical constitution or appearance;
- (d) of an inanimate object, that is created, constituted, formed or includes goods, substances or things not normally found in objects of like nature;
- (e) that is not the animal or the object or thing entered for the Class to be judged;
- (f) in breach of the Regulation.

106 An Exhibitor, or person in charge, of an animate Exhibit must:

- (a) use all reasonable steps to ensure that the Exhibit is housed and cared for in accordance with the Association's current animal welfare policy;
- (b) obey any direction from a member of the Association's Council, or from any other official of the Association, relating to the care and welfare of that or any other Exhibit;
- (c) if called upon to do so, surrender the Exhibit to the Association, in circumstances where in the reasonable opinion of the Association's Veterinarian, the Exhibit is in need of urgent veterinary attention.

107 An Exhibitor must not use, or have in his possession, any electric or electronic apparatus or any improper contrivance capable of affecting the performance of an Exhibit.

EXHIBIT UNWORTHY OF AWARD

108 An Exhibit shall not receive an award if in the opinion of the Judge it is unworthy of such award.

PROHIBITED SUBSTANCES

122 A Person must not administer a Prohibited Substance or cause one to be administered to an Exhibit, except as permitted by the By-Laws or the Regulations.

123 The Exhibitor, the Owner and Attendant of any Exhibit to which a Prohibited Substance has been administered is in breach of the By-Laws unless the Prohibited Substance is permitted by the By-Laws or Regulations to be administered.

124 An Exhibit to which a Prohibited Substance has been administered in breach of the By-Laws must be removed from the Showground upon demand by the Association.

125 The Association may in its discretion and at any time, cause an examination to be made of an Exhibit by a Veterinary Surgeon who, in the course of such examination, may:

- (a) take such samples (including, without limitation, urine, blood, saliva and faeces) from such Exhibit as he considers necessary or advisable;
- (b) have such samples tested by such methods and procedures as he considers appropriate; and
- (c) examine the Exhibit for desensitised limbs.

126 Any Exhibit found by a Veterinary Surgeon to have a limb (or part thereof) desensitised is deemed to have had administered to it a Prohibited Substance in breach of the By-Laws.

127 Where, prior to an event, a Veterinary Surgeon is of the opinion that a Prohibited Substance may have been administered to an Exhibit, the Veterinary Surgeon may require that the Exhibit be examined prior to competing in that event.

128 The Association may publish procedures relating to the examination of Exhibits. Such procedures are binding on Exhibitors, Owners and Attendants.

129 Any Exhibit which has been brought to the Showgrounds and is found to have had administered to it any prohibited substance as defined above may, without prejudice to any other action which may be taken in respect of the matter, be debarred by the Council from competing in any event for which it may have been entered.

130 The Exhibitor, the Owner and any person in charge of an animal to which a prohibited substance has been administered, by any person, and whether or not with the knowledge of the Exhibitor, Owner or person in charge, is deemed to have acted in breach of this By-Law.

130a No person shall have in his possession on the Showgrounds any prohibited substance, syringe, needle or other instrument which could be used to administer a prohibited substance to an animate Exhibit, unless that person shall have obtained the permission of the Association to be in such possession, or satisfies the Association that such possession is for lawful and proper use.

131 The Association and any servant or agent of the Association shall not be liable to an Exhibitor for the death of or for injury damage or infection which may be sustained by his Exhibit occasioned by or arising out of any act or omission of any servant or agent of the Association during the course of the testing of the Exhibit whether due to the negligence of any such Council servant or agent or otherwise.

DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE

132 If there is any inconsistency between By-Laws 133 - 153 and any other By-Laws of the Association, By-Laws 133 - 153 will prevail.

Functions of the Disciplinary Committee

133 The functions of the Disciplinary Committee shall be to hear and determine all complaints, allegations and other matters relating to:

- (a) prohibited substances, as defined in these By-Laws or Sectional Regulations.
- (b) any alleged breach of the Rules, By-Laws and Regulations of the Association by an Exhibitor and relating to an Exhibit or to a competition, except if the alleged breach is of a kind that the Chairman of a Sectional Committee considers is of a less serious nature and should properly be dealt with by the Sectional Committee, and
- (c) any other alleged breach of the Rules, By-Laws and Regulations of the Association that may be referred to the Disciplinary Committee pursuant to By-Law 137 (a).

Constitution of the Disciplinary Committee

134 The Disciplinary Committee shall comprise such members of Council as are appointed by the Council from time to time.

135 The Council shall appoint a member of the Disciplinary Committee as Chairman of the Disciplinary Committee.

136 For the purposes of any proceedings of the Disciplinary Committee, the Disciplinary Committee shall comprise, subject to By-Law 137, no less than three of its members and those persons shall constitute the Disciplinary Committee for the purpose of those proceedings.

137 If a member of the Disciplinary Committee dies or becomes otherwise unable or unwilling to participate in proceedings, then:

- (a) if this occurs prior to the commencement of any hearing in relation to the matter, the Chairman of the Disciplinary Committee shall appoint a replacement, and
- (b) if this occurs after the commencement of any hearing in relation to the matter, the remaining members of the Disciplinary Committee shall constitute the Committee for the purposes of concluding the proceedings.

Initiation of Proceedings before the Disciplinary Proceedings

138 Proceedings before the Disciplinary Committee may be initiated:

- (a) upon the request, orally or in writing, of the President, any Chairman of a Sectional Committee or Chief Executive.
- (b) upon receipt by the Chairman of the Disciplinary Committee of a written complaint relating to a matter referred to in paragraphs (a) or (b) of By-Law 133.
- (c) by the Chairman of the Disciplinary Committee on his or her own motion.

Conduct of Proceedings

139 The Disciplinary Committee may conduct proceedings at any time between 6.00am and 11.00pm on any day.

140 All persons who constitute the Disciplinary Committee for the purposes of any proceedings must be present at any hearing conducted by the Disciplinary Committee.

141 A person whose conduct is called into question in any proceedings before the Disciplinary Committee must be given notice of a hearing. It shall be sufficient for such notice to be given orally and by any such person acting with the apparent authority of the Association.

142 The Disciplinary Committee may conduct proceedings notwithstanding that any person who has been given notice fails to attend the proceedings.

143 The Disciplinary Committee shall not be bound by any rules of evidence and shall conduct the proceedings with the minimum of formality and in such a manner as it sees fit.

144 The Disciplinary Committee may require any member or Exhibitor to attend at any proceedings of the Disciplinary Committee and to furnish such information and evidence and to produce such documents relevant to the proceedings as the Disciplinary Committee seems fit.

145 The Disciplinary Committee may, at its discretion, call for and hear expert evidence.

146 No person will be legally represented without the leave of the Disciplinary Committee.

Decisions of the Disciplinary Committee

147 The Disciplinary Committee may announce its decision orally or in writing. A decision that is announced orally shall have effect in accordance with its terms.

148 If the opinion of the Disciplinary Committee is not unanimous, the decision of the majority shall prevail. The Disciplinary Committee are equally divided on any question concerning the guilt or innocence of a person, the question shall be resolved in that person's favour.

PENALTIES

149 If the Disciplinary Committee considers that there has been a breach of the Rules, By-Laws or regulations of the Association, it may impose such a penalty as it considers to be appropriate, including without limitation:

- (a) a reprimand;
- (b) a monetary fine (payable at such time/s and in such manner as the Disciplinary Committee may determine);
- (c) withdrawal or withholding of any award or ribbon;
- (d) disqualification in respect of any class;
- (e) expulsion from the Showground;
- (f) where the person concerned is a member, a suspension or termination of that membership;
- (g) a ban;
- (h) exclusion;
- (i) prohibiting a Person from Exhibiting or competing at the current Show or at any future Show;
- (j) a direction that an Exhibit be removed from the Showground;
- (k) any other mandatory requirement; and
- (l) any other penalty provided for in other regulations of the Association.

150 There shall be no appeal from any decision of the Disciplinary Committee.

Publication of Results of Disciplinary Procedures

151 The Association may publish to:

- (a) all Royal Show Societies in Australia;
- (b) the relevant Breed Societies;
- (c) the body with which the Exhibit is registered, or is eligible for registration;

the result of any proceedings before the Disciplinary Committee in which a person has been found guilty of a breach of any Rule, By-Law or Regulation.

- 152 The Association shall have no liability to any person in respect of any publication referred to in paragraph (a).
- 153 No person shall have any claim against the Association or against any Councillor, member, employee or agent of the Association in respect of any act, matter or thing done in good faith during or in connection with the proceedings before the Disciplinary Committee.

- 76 The Prize Ribbons, affixed to Exhibits, shall be distinguished by the following colours, viz:-
- Grand Champion - Red, White and Blue
Champion - Purple
Reserve Champion - Dark Green
First - Blue
Second - Red
Third - White
Fourth - Yellow
Fifth - Light Green
Sixth - Brown
Seventh - Buff
Eighth - Pink
Ninth - Orange
Tenth - Grey
Special Prizes - Pale Blue
- 77 For Group Classes - Pink and Blue, Pink and Red, Pink and White, Pink and Yellow, for First, Second, Third and Fourth respectively.

ENTRY FORMS

- Exhibitors **must complete** "STATEMENT BY EXHIBITOR" section on the front page of the entry form advising their taxation status.

PRIZE MONEY

- Prize Money stated in the Schedule **excludes GST**.
- GST will be added to the Prize Money for Exhibitors who are **registered for GST purposes**.
- The Association will provide a "Recipient Created Tax Invoice" to Exhibitors who are registered for GST purposes.

PRIVACY STATEMENT

You can be assured that the privacy of your personal information is of the utmost importance to us. The information provided by you in any application for membership or application to enter is used by the Royal National Agricultural and Industrial Association of Queensland (RNA) to offer member services or to organise and conduct competitions at the Royal Queensland Show. By applying for membership or entering such competitions you consent to provide such details as your name, address and Exhibit details. Competition information may be made available to the media and included in RNA publications.

Your information will not be disclosed without your consent for any other purpose unless required by the law. ACCOMMODATION FEE

A fee of \$10.00 per bed per night will be charged for all Boer Goat Exhibitors using RNA Accommodation facilities. This fee is to be paid on arrival on grounds at time of allocation from the Stud Beef Superintendents Office. Schools will be charged \$5.00 per bed per night.

CONDITIONS

- All Boer Goats must be registered with the Boer Goat Breeders Association of Australia Limited (BGBAA), and be the bona fide property of the Exhibitor at the closing date of entries and have a visible ear tattoo, and/or double tagging as per BGBAA rules.
- The responsibility of the eligibility of each animal entered rests solely with the Exhibitor and the correctness of these matters shall be confirmed prior to judging by an inspector appointed by the Boer Goat Breeders Association of Australia Limited (BGBAA). Any Application to Enter form that is incomplete will be returned to the Exhibitor and must be returned by closing date of entries.
- No more than 3 entries by an exhibitor in any one class
- Boer Goats are not permitted on the RNA Showgrounds before 11.30am Tuesday 16 August 2011 and must be penned by 8.00pm on that day.**
- All Boer Goats may leave the RNA Showgrounds after 3.00pm on Saturday 20 August 2011 and in any case must have vacated the grounds by 6.00pm on that day.
- No Boer Goats during the Show shall be removed from the pen without permission of the Exhibitor or his representative and the Councillor in charge, other than for the purpose of judging.
- White dustcoats must be worn during judging. Stud names or brands must not be displayed during judging.
- For Champion prizes all first prize winners of each class are to compete. After selecting the Champion, the Judge will be required to select an animal for Reserve. The reserve shall be selected from the remaining first prize animals together with the second prize winner of the class which furnished the Champion.
- An animal which in the opinion of the Councillor in charge is not in a fit state to be Exhibited, may be rejected by him and be barred from competing in the class for which it is entered. Any animal rejected must be removed from the RNA Showgrounds if so ordered by the Councillor in charge.
- In the event of the Judge deciding that the Exhibits in any Class or Championship are not worthy of any prize he shall use his discretion as to what prize, if any, to allot.
- All Boer Goats shall be fed and attended to by Exhibitors or their agents, who shall be responsible for their cleanliness and proper condition of the pens.
- The age of Boer Goats will be calculated as at **1 August 2011**.
- The use of hormones and/or tranquillisers is prohibited. Any Exhibitor violating this Regulation will be dealt with by the Council.
- Each Exhibitor may after judging display one sign not exceeding 75cm x 75cm but shall remove any such sign forthwith if directed to do so by the Council Steward who shall have full power to give such direction without giving any reason therefore.
- The Exhibitor irrevocably consents to the RNA publishing or reproducing in any manner whatsoever any particulars or information in relation to their Exhibits; the publication or reproduction may be in a printed form or visual image through electronic means and/or on the internet.
- A determination by the Councillor in charge on any question or dispute arising in or incidental to the conduct of any Competition, parade, Exhibition or event or as to the action of any Exhibit or Exhibitor or Competitor or as to proper description of anything whether animate or inanimate shall be final and binding upon all Exhibitors.

ACCEPTANCE OF ENTRIES

The attention of Exhibitors is drawn to the fact that entries are accepted subject to the Royal National Agricultural and Industrial Association of Queensland Act 1971, and to the Rules, By-Laws and Regulations of the Association. Copies of the Rules and By-Laws may be obtained upon application to the Entries Department.

In the event of too many entries, reductions may have to be made by Council Stewards to accommodate and facilitate the showing of Classes.

NOTICE TO INTENDING EXHIBITORS

Entries will only be received on the "Entry Form" enclosed with this Schedule. Entries submitted other than on the correct form will be returned to the Exhibitor and, unless all requirements are complied with and the forms returned to the office by 4.30pm on the "Entry Form" closing date as shown in the Schedule, they will not be considered.

DPI Regulations

National Livestock Identification System

The National Livestock Identification System (NLIS) is being implemented progressively in Queensland, with legislation underpinning NLIS (Goat) introduced on 1 July 2005.

A six month non-mandatory phase-in period, ending 1 January 2006, for the implementation of NLIS (Goat) has been introduced to allow government and industry to further define industry practices, policy and protocols to support the system.

Implementation timetable of NLIS (Goat) is:-

- From 17 October 2008 – Mandatory NLIS animal identification for all goats moving off the property of consignment.

NLIS has two types of tags – 'breeder' and 'post-breeder' tags.

- A 'breeder' tag is applied to stock on their property of birth.
- A 'post-breeder' tag is applied to untagged goats that are not bred on the property of consignment.

NSW/Qld Border Crossings from Killarney west are unstaffed (see 4 for details).

STOCK GENERAL

- Only **tick free stock** will be allowed entry to the grounds.
- All Queensland horses, cattle, sheep, goats, donkeys, angoras, alpacas, deer, camels and mules must be accompanied by a DPI&F Travel Permit endorsed with treatments performed (if necessary) and an Owner Waybill.
- QUEENSLAND STOCK NOT ACCOMPANIED BY A DPI&F TRAVEL PERMIT AND FULLY COMPLETED OWNER WAYBILL WILL BE REFUSED ENTRY TO THE GROUNDS.**
- BOER GOATS FROM AND RETURNING TO NEW SOUTH WALES:**

Tweed Heads & Mt Lindsay crossings. Stock crossing at these crossings require:

- Queensland Travel Permit
- Queensland Certificate of Health/Waybill - should be obtained from your local Department or Rural Lands Protection Board prior to the movement commencing.
- Owner Declaration – these will be sent out when nominations are confirmed.

Other Border Crossings from Killarney west have closed. Stock crossing at these crossings require:

- Queensland Certificate of Health/Waybill - should be obtained from your local Department or Rural Lands Protection Board prior to the movement commencing.
- Owner Declaration – these will be sent out when nominations are confirmed.

Stock must travel direct to the Exhibition Grounds. A Queensland Travel Permit will be issued at the RNA Grounds for the return journey.

The requirement to seal vehicles carrying all classes of livestock has been waived. Boer goats must travel direct to the RNA Showgrounds without unloading enroute.

Exhibitors should be aware that NSW/Queensland Border Crossings at Tweed Heads and Mt Lindsay no longer operate 24 hours. They now operate from 5.00 am to 9.00 pm. Exhibitors should make prior arrangements with the respective Border Crossing before commencing

their journey. Arrangements for the return journey should be made at the RNA Stock Office.

5. IMPORTANT

It is the responsibility of the Owner or person-in-charge of the stock to ensure that the cattle tick requirements have been fulfilled in regard to the entry treatments. Persons not fulfilling the requirements will be refused entry to the grounds.

It is the responsibility of the Owner/person-in-charge of the stock to contact their nearest Department of Primary Industries Stock Inspector and arrange for the issue of a Travel.

TICK TREATMENTS (EX TICK INFECTED ZONES)

- Boer goats from the Tick Infected zones in Queensland – Permit and "Move Easy" waybill required.
- Boer goats must be **Free of Cattle Ticks**.
- It is the responsibility of boer goat Owners to ensure their charges are tick free. Any boer goats which have had any risk of exposure to cattle tick should be treated by the Owner with an approved tickicide 3-7 days prior to entry. The tickicide used and date administered should be provided to the local Inspector of Stock when obtaining your Travel Permit.
- All boer goats must be presented to the standard expected at a Royal National Show. Boer goats which do not come up to standard may be refused entry or asked to leave the grounds. Boer goats from the Infected Zone staying at the RNA grounds for longer than 5 days may be inspected at the grounds. Random inspections will be conducted on other boer goats from Tick Infected Zones.

JOHNE'S DISEASE – for both Bovine Johne's disease (BJD) and Ovine Johne's disease (OJD).

Boer goats wishing to enter the RNA must comply with the conditions for animals to enter Queensland if:-

- they are from an unrestricted herd in a zone declared by another State or Territory as a Protected Zone or Free Zone for BJD and a Very Low Prevalence Area for OJD; or
- they are from a Check Tested (negative) (CT(n)), Monitored Negative 1 (MN1) or equivalent or better status herd established under the Market Assurance Program (MAP) for goats if they originate from a Control Zone for BJD (cattle), or a Low Prevalence area or better for OJD; (the conditions for the Zone or Area of lower status apply); or
- they are from a MN1 or equivalent or better status herd in a Residual Zone for BJD, or a Medium or High Prevalence Area for OJD; or
- they are from an MN1 status herd if they are from a property that adjoins an OJD Infected (IN) property.
- Other – The herd history to be provided to RNA at the time of nomination. Each will be assessed by the RNA Animal Health Committee.

VEHICLES

Any vehicle which at any time has carried stock within a tick infected zone, must be cleaned out to the satisfaction of a Stock Inspector. Such vehicles must not carry any stock other than cleansed show stock prior to entry to the RNA Grounds.

DISCLAIMER: While the conditions of entry with regard to disease are correct at the time of publication it is the responsibility of the Owner that all conditions current at the time of entry are met.

FODDER AND BEDDING REQUIREMENTS AND CONDITIONS

- Hay, Chaff, Straw, Silage and Green Fodder may only be introduced if:
 - It is grown in and held in a Tick Free Zone and transported directly to the RNA Grounds.

OR

- (b) It originates from a Cattle Tick Infected Zone but the fodder has not had contact with livestock in the nine months prior to entry to the RNA Grounds.

OR

- (d) It is silage from a Cattle Tick Infected Zone which has been harvested and wrapped in plastic for a period of not less than 28 days prior to entry to the RNA Grounds.

All fodder must be accompanied by a fully completed 'Certificate of Entry of Hay/Chaff/Straw or Green Feed to the RNA Showgrounds, Brisbane: Owner Declaration'.

If fodder is accompanying livestock from interstate a description of the fodder may be endorsed on the livestock permit or Owner Declaration.

1. Materials not carrying the necessary certificate under the above Regulations will not gain entry to the RNA grounds.
2. It is the responsibility of the Exhibitor to provide all fodder and bedding requirements.
3. The following materials may be used for bedding:-
 - (a) Sawdust or similar material.
 - (b) Cereal Straw.
 - (c) Pasture hay.
4. Within the limits of the storage space assigned to Exhibitors they may not bring in more than initial bedding plus 3 bales of straw or pasture hay for each Exhibit prior to the commencement of Show.
5. After midnight on the Wednesday prior to the start of the Show, no fodder or hay type bedding be permitted onto the grounds unless for, and accompanied by, livestock on the same vehicle, unless the Director otherwise permits.

Gatekeepers will have been instructed with regard to these conditions and any hay or straw not certified will be refused entry to the grounds.

WORKPLACE HEALTH AND SAFETY ACT 1995

1. The RNA Showgrounds is a designated Workplace within the meaning of the Act and Exhibitors/competitors are required to ensure that they and all persons under their direction or control, including their contractors or sub-contractors, comply with all requirements of the Act and the RNA holds each Exhibitor responsible to discharge its obligations to provide and maintain a safe place and system of work during occupation by the Exhibitor/competitor of any area of the Showgrounds.
2. Each Exhibitor/competitor will assess the risk to themselves, staff, volunteers, family, other Exhibitors, RNA staff, show visitors and any person foreseeably affected by the presentation of their Exhibit.
3. Risks identified by Exhibitors/competitors will be eliminated or controlled by the Exhibitor/competitor and particular attention will be paid to ensuring public safety and safety of other Exhibitors/competitors.
4. Exhibits will only be led and handled by competent persons whose experience is known to the Exhibitor/competitor.
5. A "No Smoking Policy" will be strictly adhered to and policed by Exhibitors/competitors and Exhibitors/competitors are advised that the use of Primus stoves, any heating or lighting appliances of a like character, or any naked light, is strictly **prohibited** in the horse stalls or pavilions.

6. Any Exhibitors/competitors intending to bring electrical equipment to the Showgrounds will be required to ensure that such equipment is fitted with residual current protection and that all electrical leads, tools and appliances have been inspected by a licensed electrical contractor and currently tagged. The use of double adaptors is **prohibited** and all power boards must be tested and tagged.
7. All Exhibitors/competitors will comply with the requirements of the Act and its Regulations and Standards in every other respect.

This is essential for the safety of all Exhibitors/competitors and the general public. The Act imposes very severe penalties in the event of non-compliance with its provisions.

Any Exhibitors/competitors who do not comply will not be allowed to Exhibit at the Brisbane Exhibition

VETERINARY SERVICES

The official veterinary surgeons are permitted to charge their normal consultation fees plus an hourly rate for extended services. In addition Exhibitors will be required to pay the cost of all drugs used. Exhibitors will be responsible for the payment of all monies owing to the veterinary surgeons.
